OUR MISSION

The Southworth Library provides materials, services and programming to meet the diverse educational, recreational and cultural needs of the Dryden area. We not only support access to information, inspire the love of reading and promote literacy and lifelong learning, we are also a comfortable, friendly gathering place, which reaches out to community members of all ages. In addition to the regular circulation of library materials (including books, audio books, videos, and downloadable materials), and our popular programs for children, teens and adults, the

library developed new programs and collaborations. We continue to reach beyond traditional literacy services, with STEM based book clubs and programs, outreach to local schools, day care centers, senior centers and residential facilities. We provide access to digital services and internet access for the community. We are proud to be a cornerstone in our community for social connections, information resources and programs & events for all ages.

Neil Gaiman, a well-known author, said, "A library is a place that is a repository of information and gives every citizen equal access to it. It's a community space. It's a place of safety, a haven from the world". As I reflect on the past year, I can attest to its validity. This library is so much more than the materials we circulate and even the many services we provide. We are a community gathering place and an essential part of its social structure. Every time we issue a library card or place a hold for materials for one of our patrons, we are connecting them not only to the information and resources we provide, but also to the greater community in which they live.

Through programs and activities that go beyond traditional library services, we also create a shared sense of community and neighborhood. This year, we experienced the excitement of seeing lunar rock samples and trying on Apollo Flight suits from NASA. We petted farm animals, handled snakes and learned from the zoomobile. We read to dogs and watched the process of a monarch butterfly cycle. We experienced hands-on science with professionals in the field, participated in multi-generational programs for families and children and learned how to use the 3D printer. We engaged in public discourse on community, politics and the American Creed and enjoyed author visits and Skype sessions. Lifelong learners enjoyed art and history classes. We connected learning to history and science through book clubs for children and provided after hours programs for teens. Our collaborations with community groups and efforts included early literacy partners, the William George Agency, the local firefighters, the schools, Willowbrook Senior Housing, local universities and colleges and the other rural libraries in our county. We continue to seek ways to bring more information and resources to our community and provide friendly accessible services and programming. - Diane Pamel- Library Director




